I've been involved with the Rainshelter Project from the beginning and I can definitely say we have a lot left to survey.

Climb up fifteen feet and then climb four more short waterfall climbs and enter a long lead which is walking passage ( 400 standard streba units). Many leads to the left and the right, all unsurveyed, unexplored, well, maybe once. There is one particular lead which takes you to a room filled with thousands of tabular gypsum rosettes. Another lead takes you to a crawl with gypsum flowers.

The passage to the Wall Room leads to an upper passage (45 feet high) which is still unexplored. John Neack climbed free for thirty feet then slid down. He left lots of skin to mark the route for the next expedition. Thanks, John. That climb has your name on it. (or at least your skin.)
